# DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Dear Residents,

The Paramus Health Department is pleased to present the 2022 Annual Report. This report summarizes our efforts which align with our mission to prevent disease, disability, and premature death, and to promote the physical and mental well-being for all who live, work, and do business in the Borough of Paramus. As we entered into 2022, we were amidst a surge of COVID-19 cases from the Omicron variant. As new cases surged, not even the Health Department staff was spared, but we continued to function at full capacity to provide all essential services. One reason that the Omicron variant seemed to spread so quickly was because it caused more cases among vaccinated individuals than earlier variants, although the cases were milder or asymptomatic because of vaccine protection. The good news was that we had vaccines and boosters, and we were familiar with multi-level prevention strategies such as masking in public indoor settings, practicing social distancing, frequent handwashing, improving ventilation, and testing to slow transmission. Our testing location at the Paramus Municipal pool was flooded with Borough employees, residents, and surrounding community members, and this proved to be an invaluable resource to slow down transmission. Our nursing staff continued to investigate cases, advise schools and long-term care facilities on infection control measures, and contact tracers were put to task. Our nurses were there to answer questions on new and ever evolving guidance and recommendations.

On Monday March 7<sup>th</sup>, Governor Murphy ended the COVID-19 public health emergency through Executive Order No. 292. We saw this as a step toward normalcy after an unprecedented two years. As always, we continued to monitor cases, promote testing and vaccination, and highlight the importance of masking when social distancing could not be maintained.

While COVID-19 continued to be at the forefront of our daily tasks, none of our other imperative services suffered. The environmental staff continued inspecting our retail food establishments to ensure food safety, and addressed complaints of various nature. Our registrars of vital statistics continued to issue vital records and process marriage applications. The health education team offered virtual trainings on relevant health topics, such as nutrition and diabetes, and launched a Paramus Walks program in Van Saun Park with tremendous community participation.

During November and December, Influenza activity reached high levels statewide. Emergency Department visits and outpatient provider visits associated with influenza-like illnesses were the highest in a decade for that time of year.

Outbreaks of Influenza and Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) continued to be reported in all settings throughout the State, predominately in school and childcare settings.

The winter brought three major respiratory viruses, RSV, the Flu, and COVID-19, which collided in the United States in what officials called a “triple-demic,” and the worst impacts were on children. In response to the increased activity, the Health Department set up testing locations during December to test for COVID-19, Flu, and RSV for all adults and children.

We are proud of the progress that we have made to ensure positive health outcomes for all Paramus residents, and the resiliency of our community is remarkable. All of the progress could not have been possible without the dedication of the Paramus Health Department staff. I would like to thank the staff for their continued hard work and efforts in ensuring the well-being of all Paramus residents.

**Excellence** – We aim to provide all our services and conduct all our actions at the highest level.



## PARAMUS BOARD OF HEALTH

The Paramus Board of Health is a legally constituted, autonomous body made up of five members that are appointed by the Mayor and Council to create health policy for the Borough. The Board is empowered by State Statute to enact local ordinances to protect the public health and to provide programs in five major areas, including Administration, Environmental Health, Communicable Disease Control, Maternal and Child Health, and Chronic Illness detection and Control.

## WHAT IS PUBLIC HEALTH?



**Public Health**  
Prevent. Promote. Protect.

Public health is a multidisciplinary field whose goal is to promote the health of the population through organized community efforts. In contrast to medicine, which focuses mainly on treating illness in separate individuals, public health focuses on preventing illness in the community. Key public health activities include assessing the health status of the population, diagnosing its problems, searching for the causes of those problems and designing solutions for them. The solutions usually

involve community-level interventions that control or prevent the cause of the problem. For example, public health interventions include establishing educational programs to discourage teenagers from vaping or smoking, implementing screening programs for the early detection of diabetes, and passing laws that require automobile drivers and passengers to wear seat belts.

## TEN ESSENTIAL PUBLIC HEALTH SERVICES

- Monitor health status to identify community health problems
- Diagnose and investigate health problems in the community
- Inform, educate, and empower people regarding health issues
- Mobilize community partnerships to identify and solve health problems
- Develop policies and plans which support individual and community health efforts
- Enforce the laws and regulations that protect health and ensure safety
- Link people to needed personal health services and assure health care when it is otherwise unavailable
- Ensure a competent local public health system and assure a competent personal health care workforce
- Evaluate the effectiveness, accessibility, and quality of personal and population-based health services
- Research for innovative solutions to health problems

The synthesis of nursing practice and public health practice encompasses protecting and promoting physical and mental health and preventing disease, injury, and disability. Public health nursing practice incorporates the core public health functions of assessment, assurance, and policy development within the art and science of professional nursing practice through a systematic process which promotes and protects the public health.

## VITAL STATISTICS & FINANCIAL REPORT

The National Vital Statistics System of the National Center for Health Statistics (NCHS) compiles and publishes data on births, deaths, marriages, divorces, and fetal deaths in the United States. Registration offices in all 50 states, the District of Columbia, and New York City have provided information on births and deaths since 1933. Most birth and death certificates used in the 50 states correspond closely in content and organization to the standard certificate recommended by NCHS. Public health data collected currently on birth certificates includes birth weight, gestational age, and adverse pediatric conditions. Death certificates collect information on diseases, injuries, and complications that directly caused the death.

## ENVIRONMENTAL HEALTH



For centuries, laws have been in place in the United States and around the world to protect the health of residents, with the earliest focused in issues of sanitation and hygiene. With training in subject areas such as environmental health, biology, and chemistry, the Registered Environmental Health Specialists (REHS) are prepared to inspect a range of licensed establishments. Retail food establishments are inspected to assure the safe handling, storage and

preparation of food to prevent foodborne illnesses. Pet shops are inspected to assure safe handling, hygiene practices of animals, and ensure that animals are protected from any form of animal cruelty. Permanent cosmetic establishments must demonstrate safe practices to prevent the spread of diseases such as Hepatitis B, C, and HIV. The primary activities of the Environmental Division professionals are inspections of retail food establishments and the investigations of nuisance and environmental complaints.

## ANIMAL CONTROL

The Paramus Health Department contracts animal control services through an agreement with Tyco Animal Control Services. Tyco has been appointed as Certified Animal Control Officer and Cruelty Investigator for the Borough and is responsible for impounding lost and stray animals and rescuing or removing sick, dangerous, diseased or injured wildlife. Tyco also provides humane trapping of wildlife on Borough property, facilitates the removal of feral cat colonies, removes dead animals from roadways, and assists with the dispersal of Canadian Geese on Borough property.
